Some of the highlights included feeding and petting the goats, holding a newborn kid, and playing together in the field afterwards.


A huge thank you to John McDonald for his warm welcome and for sharing his knowledge about the goats and how the farm is run. It was a truly memorable and educational day for all!

We had a fantastic school tour to Scattery Island, where we learned about St. Senan, explored the round tower, and enjoyed a boat trip, going through the lock and even had a swim off the island. We found out that Scattery's round tower is one of only two in Ireland with a door at ground level—it was probably just used as a bell tower.

We followed this up with a trip to the Burren, visiting Eagle's Rock and hearing the magical story of St. Colman and the Path of the Dishes. While there, we learned about the clints and grikes (the cracks and blocks in the limestone) and spotted some of the beautiful wildflowers that grow in the area.

We finished this project with a visit to Kilmacduagh, where we saw Ireland's tallest round tower and compared it to the one on Scattery.

Back at school, we've been visiting the library, making sure everyone has a library card and is signed up for the Summer Stars reading programme—great for keeping up reading over the holidays!

Thanks to a generous grant from the Heritage in Schools Scheme, our school took part in a wonderful project combining heritage, creativity, and outdoor learning. Organised by Sinead Kelly SET, who applied for and coordinated the initiative, all pupils from 1st to 6th class participated in a Willow Weaving Workshop led by expert weavers.

Over several sessions, the children learned traditional weaving techniques and helped create a stunning willow dome, now standing proudly in the field we've dedicated to outdoor learning. This living structure is expected to last for many years and will serve as both a classroom and a reminder of the heritage skills gained.

As part of another funded project, 1st and 2nd class also enjoyed a special trip to Scattery Island, where they explored the island's monastic history and unique natural environment, connecting deeply with Ireland's past.

Board of Management Reports

31st March 2025

- World Book Day 2025—staff members organised several excellent book-related events, there was a great turnout of parents on the day
- St Patrick's Day—Mol an Óige won the award for Best Walking Group at the Ennistymon parade, the majority of staff members and pupils took part
- NEPS psychologist—consultation visit
- Parents' Association—meeting with the acting principal as part of the process of developing a 'vision' for the school
- The PA agreed to participate in the process of reviewing school policies, as appropriate, by providing feedback on them and making suggestions to improve them
- CPD—the acting principal completed a training module entitled 'The Principles of SEN', and shared a brief report with staff members
- Planning—at a recent In-School Planning Day, teachers' planning templates were reviewed and updated (as per a recommendation in the School Improvement Plan); a behaviour specialist did a workshop with staff members; staff members participated in an Autism Awareness session under the guidance of a visiting expert
